H.E. Ambassador David Donoghue, Permanent Mission of Ireland to the United Nations

David Donoghue has been Ambassador and Permanent Representative of Ireland to the United Nations since 2013. In 2014-15 he served as a co-facilitator (with Kenya) of major UN negotiations which led to the adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in September 2015. Prior to his appointment as Permanent Representative, Ambassador Donoghue held the position of Political Director of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Dublin from 2009-2013; he previously served as Irish Ambassador to Germany (2006-2009), Irish Ambassador to Austria and the Vienna-based UN agencies (2004-2006), and Irish Ambassador to the Russian Federation, with side accreditations to Belarus, Georgia, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan (1999-2001). From 2001 to 2004, Ambassador Donoghue was Director-General of the Irish Government's development cooperation programme. He also has extensive experience in Anglo-Irish relations, and was involved in the negotiation of the Anglo-Irish Agreement and the Good Friday Agreement, and served as Irish head of the Anglo-Irish Secretariat in Belfast from 1995-1999. From 1977-1991, he had postings in various Irish Embassies. An Irish national, Ambassador Donoghue holds an MA in German and a BA (Hons) in French and German from the National University of Ireland.

H.E. Ambassador Ignace Gata Mavita, Permanent Mission of the Democratic Republic of Congo to the United Nations

Ignace Gata Mavita Wa Lufuta has been Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary and Permanent Representative of the Democratic Republic of Congo to the United Nations since 2012. Prior to his appointment as Permanent Representative, Ambassador Gata Mavita was Deputy Minister of Foreign Affaris from 2007-2012. He has had a career in public administration and public service since 1976, beginning as an officer in the Office of Interior, Kinshasa, and including several posts in Katanga and Bandundu provinces, among others throughout the country. He has worked on international research and litigation through membership on Regional Commissions. He is an honorary Officer of King Leopold II and is the Chevalier of The National Order of the Leopard. Born in Popokabaka, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ambassador Ignace Gata Mavita holds a degree in Political Science from the UNAZA, Université Nationale du Zaïre, and a Diploma in Public Management, University Charleroi, Belgium.
